



Shaping a healthier future

What the proposals mean for Hounslow residents

Between 2 July and 8 October 2012 NHS North West London is consulting on plans to improve NHS hospital and community services. We want to hear the views of as many people as possible about the changes proposed. This document focuses on the details of these proposals for Hounslow residents.

A summary of our proposals

The National Health Service provides healthcare for more than 270,000 people in Hounslow and has high expectations for the way patients are cared for and the services they receive. NHS staff are totally committed to delivering high-quality care, but need to have the right workforce, skills and surroundings to guarantee this for all patients all of the time.

Increasingly, a number of different factors are making it very difficult for us to provide high quality services consistently. We have a growing and ageing population which means the demand for our services is rising. Our out-of-hospital services are not operating as effectively as they should be, reflected by Hounslow's relatively high numbers of emergency admissions and use of accident and emergency (A&E). Overall, patients tell us that services need to improve, as patient satisfaction scores are average or below average. We need to make these improvements whilst working within an increasingly tight budget.

In response to this, our vision is to:

- **Bring more healthcare services nearer to you** so that as much healthcare as possible can be delivered closer to your home. We will invest between £8 million and £9 million over the next three years in healthcare in Hounslow.
- **Centralise some hospital care** onto fewer hospital sites so that specialist clinical expertise is available more consistently, in line with guidelines set down by a number of medical royal colleges.
- Incorporate all of this into **one co-ordinated system of care** so that all the organisations and facilities involved in caring for you can deliver high-quality care and an excellent experience, as much of the time as possible.

To achieve this we have proposed to:

- Deliver more services in **healthcare settings other than hospitals**, closer to people's homes
- **Change some services at the following hospitals** – Central Middlesex, Charing Cross, Chelsea and Westminster, Ealing, Hammersmith, Hillingdon, Northwick Park, St Mary's and West Middlesex.

While most healthcare activity would remain where it is now, and all nine NW London hospitals will have local hospital services including an urgent care centre and outpatients, the changes proposed would impact on some A&E, maternity and paediatric and hyper-acute services at some hospitals in north west London.



World-class healthcare outside of hospital

Hounslow Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), the organisation being led by GPs to plan healthcare services, came into existence in April 2011. The objective of the NHS is to provide the right care at the right time and at the right place for the residents of Hounslow.

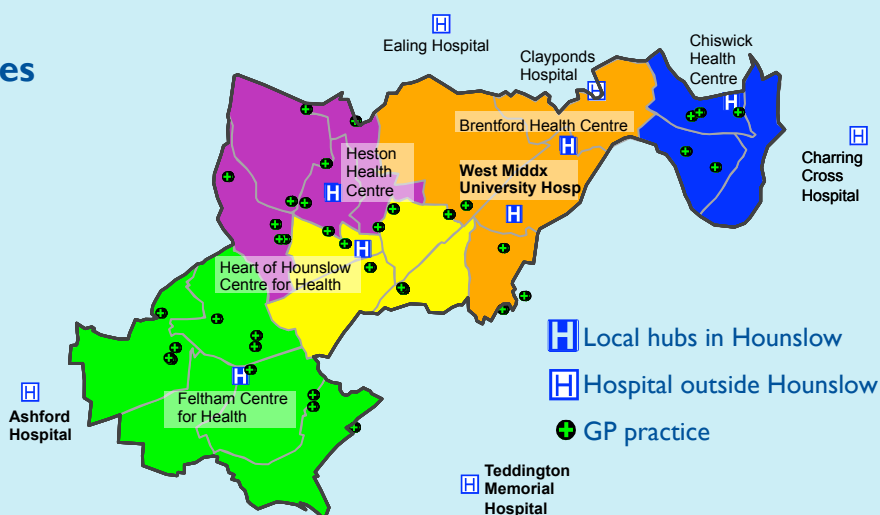
How we plan to organise your care outside of hospital

In Hounslow care will be delivered and managed at three levels. Hounslow GPs will work in five new 'sub-groups' ensuring care is clinically led and consistent across GP practices.

The vision of Hounslow CCG

Hounslow CCG's vision is to ensure that our health care system keeps patients well at home and, when patients do become unwell, provides cost-effective, evidence-based and timely care at the right place appropriate to their needs. This will mean:

- Making sure that every healthcare provider consistently delivers **high standards of care**
- **Joint working** between GPs, community and social care, hospital and consultants, with early intervention and care in the right place at the right time
- Patients having easier access to **consistently high quality primary care**
- Patients with long-term conditions who need care from different services will receive **better coordinated care** with one package of care
- Patients will be better supported when they are discharged from hospital. The care they receive will be more joined-up between the different parts of the system.

Our development plans

Development plans for Hounslow's out-of-hospital services include:

- **The new NHS 111 number:** when you need medical help fast but it's not a 999 emergency Hounslow residents can now call 111 for free advice, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
- **Improving access to GPs:** will mean greater use of email, text, video and telephone to get information and consultations. Patients will also have the opportunity to go to another GP to access a wider range of services.
- **More integrated care:** especially for people most at risk of getting ill, including older people aged over 75s, people with diabetes, and those who have had an excessive number of emergency admissions in the last year. This will ensure all the services that the patient needs are working together.
- **Everyone in the system working together for people leaving hospital:** will allow particularly older people to leave hospital as soon as they are medically fit. At discharge, some people require hospital, community and social services to work together and take a joint approach across health and social care. This is particularly important for older people to help them retain their independence.
- **Providing more outpatient consultations in a community setting:** developing community-based pathways of care for a number of key services, for example asthmatic children.

Hospital services

NHS North West London is consulting on three possible options for changes to hospital services in north west London and has also stated which of the three is its preferred option.

The West Middlesex Hospital is facing significant challenges over the next few years to deliver a balanced budget. This is mainly because it doesn't deliver a sufficient volume of healthcare that generates enough income to enable it to balance the books.

Under Options A and B the West Middlesex Hospital will remain a major hospital. This means it will continue to provide a full range of high-quality clinical services for patients with urgent or complex healthcare needs, including a full A&E department open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with emergency surgery and medicine and an intensive care unit that can care for the most seriously ill patients.

Investment is planned to provide the capacity that will be needed to take future increases in expected activity at the hospital.

For Hounslow residents who use hospitals in the neighbouring boroughs, Northwick Park will also remain a major hospital, however people who use Ealing hospital may be affected.

Under options A and B, Ealing hospital would become a **local hospital**. This type of hospital provides all the most common things people need hospitals for, such as less severe injuries and less severe urgent care, non-life threatening illnesses, care for most long-term conditions such as diabetes and asthma, and diagnostic services. Under each of these options, Ealing would see its A&E department become an urgent care centre and its maternity unit would close.

Under option C, Ealing hospital would be the major hospital and the West Middlesex would be the local hospital. This means that its accident and emergency unit and the maternity units at Ealing would remain broadly as they are and those at the West Middlesex would change.



Urgent Care at the West Middlesex Hospital

The West Middlesex Hospital already has an Urgent Care Centre (UCC) operating 24 hours a day and this will continue under all options.

UCCs are staffed by GPs and nurses and specialise in the treatment of patients with urgent illnesses and injuries and conditions that can be seen and treated without having to stay in hospital. Clinicians at UCCs are also skilled in stabilising patients who do need to be transferred to more specialist care.

Our clinical leaders are clear that the UCC at the West Middlesex Hospital should see and treat patients within four hours, be led by primary care clinicians such as GPs, be linked with other services like the new '111' non-emergency NHS number and have access to tests and specialist clinicians.

The kinds of health problems all urgent care centres are able to treat include:

- Illnesses and injuries not likely to need a stay in hospital;
- X-rays and other tests;
- Minor fractures (breaks);
- Stitching wounds;
- Draining abscesses that don't need a general anaesthetic; and
- Minor ear, nose, throat and eye infections.

Urgent care centres will see patients of all ages, including children.

Urgent care centres do not treat problems such as major burns, head injuries, strokes, sickle-cell crisis, severe shortness of breath, heart failure, overdoses and self-harm. Patients experiencing these will be transferred to the West Middlesex Hospital.

ANNEX A: Summary of options for hospital services

Option A (preferred option)

This option has Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, Hillingdon Hospital, Northwick Park Hospital, St Mary's Hospital and West Middlesex Hospital as major hospitals. It has Central Middlesex Hospital as a local and elective hospital and Hammersmith Hospital as a specialist hospital. Ealing Hospital and Charing Cross Hospital are proposed as local hospitals.

Option B

This option has Charing Cross Hospital, Hillingdon Hospital, Northwick Park Hospital, St Mary's Hospital and West Middlesex Hospital as major hospitals. It has Central Middlesex Hospital as a local and elective hospital, and Hammersmith Hospital as a specialist hospital. Ealing Hospital and Chelsea and Westminster Hospital would be local hospitals.

Option C

This option has Chelsea and Westminster Hospital, Ealing Hospital (with the stroke unit at West Middlesex Hospital moved to Ealing Hospital), Hillingdon Hospital, Northwick Park Hospital and St Mary's Hospital as the major hospitals. It has Central Middlesex Hospital and West Middlesex Hospital as a local and elective hospital and Hammersmith Hospital as a specialist hospital. Charing Cross Hospital is proposed as a local hospital.
